#### Dearest Sisters and Partners-in-Mission,

During these past few tumultuous weeks, in prayer and contemplation, I'm constantly reminded of the importance of our interconnectivity as a congregation and Institute. Over this time our interconnectedness has often found expression through messages of solidarity and acts of kindness.

Deep within, all of us longs to be connected, to find safety, acceptance, meaning and purpose within a greater whole. In different cultures we express the 'I am because you are you'. May we always pray for and remember each other, working on our interconnection in our Cabrini World, so that we may become the true bearers of the love of Christ we always yearn to be.

#### Quarter 1 2020 Update

The International Health Commission was established in September 2018. Our purpose is to support the General Superior to evaluate and provide strategic support to the health missions around the Cabrini World in light of the XV General Chapter outcomes.

We began our work by:

- i) articulating general standards for health service delivery,
- ii) agreeing to evaluate the thematic areas of maternal and child health and preventing and treating malnutrition, and
- iii) designing a standard evaluation process for all our health ministries.

In this way, from our inception and early stages, our work has been designed to **strengthen enhance the interconnectivity between our Cabrini health missions**.

To date, we have reviewed the self-assessments completed by the health ministries in **Argentina**, **Eswatini and Guatemala** and conducted an in-country external review in **Eswatini (August 2019) and Guatemala (February 2020)**.

Whilst we are yet to complete the process for all of the health services, the experience so far has given us a great sense of the good that is being done as each service strives to respond to the needs of their own local community. **We have been impressed with the high level of staff engagement, professionalism and enthusiasm**. One theme already emerging is the need to improve communication – internally, with the community and with potential funders and donors. We are in the process of consulting with the local Superiors to understand how we might best respond to this finding and the other areas identified for capacity strengthening.

The original intent in focusing on the two thematic areas was to enable us to **maximise the impact of our health services in line with the United Nations Sustainable Development Goals**. The phrase 'think global, act local' more accurately reflects the situation we have found so far. We are now considering ways to encourage relationships between the services so that individual strengths can be leveraged across the group, for example, in joint funding applications.

We look forward to sharing more news in future editions of this newsletter.



# Special Message: Remembering our Shared Mission in the Face of COVID-19

When the **International Health Commission last met in late March 2020**, Italy had overtaken China with the highest number of deaths from the virus, New York was bracing for a rapid increase in cases, Australia looked to be following a similar trend with a time lag of a few weeks, the clinic in Argentina had closed and the first cases of the virus had been diagnosed in Ethiopia, Eswatini and Papua New Guinea.

Much has changed in the last two and a half weeks. Some countries are faring better than expected and many are faring worse. In the unceasing coverage of death and devastation, one of the more positive images is of health workers being hailed as heroes as they turn up to work each day, putting their own lives at risk as they care for the sick and dying. We thank the IHC members, who in their personal and professional capacities, are playing an important part in the fight against COVID-19, some within their local geographic contexts and others internationally in their role as global health experts. We thank them also for the technical assistance provided to the MSC health missions.

As we battle this global pandemic in each of our health missions around the world, we are even more strongly connected to one another. We are praying for each of you and those for whom you care.

May you be strengthened by our love, and the hope and joy of the resurrection this Easter season.

# Interconnectivity within Our Institute through Impact Investing

**Impact Investing** is an exciting and rapidly growing field powered by investors who are determined to generate social and environmental impact as well as financial returns.

The Missionary Sisters have actually been doing impact investing since the inception of our Institute! Our very own ministries represent what today's progressive investors call "social enterprises".

At the **Institute's Finance Office** we differentiate our internal and external investing. **"Internal"** being investments in all our **MSC ministries** (education, health, elderly care, refugee and immigrant services, and more). **"External"** being our new way of directing the Institute's investment money to generate not only financial returns but also **positive social and environmental impacts**.

In order to strategically invest internally we need to understand our "Cabrini World". Therefore in August 2019 we embarked on a global financial sustainability study. This analysis of the Institute's current and future needs considers communities and works in all 17 countries, including the Generalate. The results will be used to assist leadership in making well-informed decisions regarding the use of the temporal goods to support our Sisters and mission.

We feel that the sustainability study project and the **International Meeting of Treasurers and Administrators (Codogno, May 2019)** have fostered new kinds of interconnectivity within the Institute. Thanks to the cooperation of all stakeholders, particularly the Provincial/Regional Superiors, we now speak regularly with finance administrators throughout the world. We are all working together to help guide the use of temporal goods throughout the Institute.

# **EXTERNAL**

The goal of our external impact investments is to **expand the reach of our mission to serve the most vulnerable populations around the world**.

As we look to support organizations that complement, mirror, or parallel the work of our MSC ministries, we've developed relationships with many organizations that directly serve immigrants and refugees. Connecting these organizations to our Cabrini family strengthens our mission while deepening the Institute's interconnectivity. We also strive to share our knowledge of external impact investing across our Cabrini World.

Here are some ways we see our impact investing portfolio's interconnectivity with the MSC Ministries deepening:

#### **CURRENT**



#### **Cabrini Immigration Services**

We helped connect Cabrini Immigration Services' lawyers to a Salvadoran family held in immigration detention.



#### **London Community**

We supported our London community's search for a values-aligned banking solution. We also shared tools and resources with provincial investment staff interested in using temporal goods for mission.



#### **Religious Communities Impact Fund**

**Our investment in Religious Communities Impact** 

Fund is a partnership that helps to deepen our interconnectivity with other Catholic Organizations. They are an organization of Catholic women's religious that are called to use their financial resources as a ministry by investing in projects consistent with the Gospel mission of economic justice for all.



#### **FUTURE**

We also hope to increasingly use our external impact investments to **strengthen** interconnectivity within the Cabrini family and to other Catholic religious congregations.

Here are some of our ideas:

Through a social enterprise called Beneficial Returns, we invest in a company called EcoFiltro in Guatemala.

They produce and distribute low-cost clean water filters in Guatemala. This group could potentially work with our Guatemalan missions to complement our community health efforts in the country!

We connected with Opes, an Italian organization that seeks partners to support Italian social enterprises dedicated to refugees and at-risk youth in Italy. We would love to connect this group with Casa Cabrini in Rome.



Through Beneficial Returns we will also be supporting Fundación Paraguaya, a not-for-profit that focuses on poverty alleviation by running self-sustaining rural agriculture schools, offering microfinance loans, and providing entrepreneurship training. Our loan will support the expansion of the agriculture school's dairy facility so that the students can package and sell the cheese they make. At the right time, we can be the linking point between the group and Santa Francisca Cabrini Province.

We invest in an organization called One Acre Fund that provides fertilizer, seeds, tools, and training for small-holder farmers across Africa.

This holds potential for our future work in Northern Uganda!

We are continually working to ensure our investments compliment and build on the work already achieved by the Sisters and partners-in-mission throughout our Cabrini World. Ultimately we acquire a deeper level of understanding about the outworking of our Cabrinian mission, key issues and strategic approaches from our engagements with the MSC



ministries. We hope in future to have structural ways for the partners that we work with under the investment portfolio to be able to learn from our various MSC ministries too.
